SCHOOL BOARD'S MESSAGE TO OUR COMMUNITY

2020 presented an array of unprecedented challenges for the Town entities and our citizens. Due to CV-19, Sunapee Schools were disrupted in March by a rapid transition to online learning. I commend the incredible effort and dedication invested by the staff, teachers, leadership team, students, and their families to endure through this challenging time. The resilience of the Sunapee Schools spirit and community were evident through many feats of creative problem solving and care. Completion of the 2019-2020 school year was punctuated by the successful physically distanced in-person graduation at Mount Sunapee.



The 2020-2021 school year signaled a return to in-person learning that has been successful as a result of extensive planning, including physical spacing, cleaning, mask requirements and additional new protocols. It has truly been a team effort with everyone involved to make this work. While many other districts have been hybrid or remote, Sunapee K-12 education has remained in-person and on plan.

The challenges presented by the conditions of Sunapee Schools facilities, and Sunapee Central Elementary School in particular, have been a recurring topic of concern and debate in town for decades. The SCES building is in need of significant investment in order to sustain continued and long-term use. Updates to health, safety, and American Disabilities Act (ADA) code compliance issues, electrical and plumbing system upgrades,

installation of a mechanical ventilation system in addition to other core features need to be addressed as a matter of priority. In addition, the modular classrooms in the parking lot are at the end of their life with a variety of issues also demanding attention.

In response to feedback from voters regarding prior modernization and repair proposals, interactive brainstorming sessions, discussion and public forums were pursued by the Board in 2019-2020 to learn from citizens and consultants how best to proceed with Sunapee K-12 in order to provide safe and adequate facilities for learning. In March, 2020, a \$24.6M single campus K-12 plan was presented to voters with 49.4% of the needed 60% of voter approval achieved.

With responsibility to pursue a solution to address long known issues as described above, the Board listened to voter feedback and reconsidered the scale of the proposed project. Working with a new consultant after the March, 2020 vote, a significantly scaled down proposal addressing only the most imminent needs specific to SCES was drafted. This process sought to greatly reduce the total project cost and eliminate the proposal for a single K-12 campus and off-site athletic fields. The new scaled down proposal intends to sustain use of the 1918

Sunapee Elementary School on the hill and invest in fixing what we own. The \$10.6M proposal will fix all critical issues and replace the outdated modular classrooms with a small addition to the main building. This proposal will be brought to voters in March. SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE TO THE COMMUNITY

This has been a year like no other during which the Sunapee School District has demonstrated its resilience and dedication to public education and its commitment to the students and families in this community. While a national pandemic continues to hang over the world, Sunapee has been able to open its doors for in-person, face-to-face education for over 95% of our students. While the safety of our students, faculty, staff, parents and community have been our top priority, we have been able to develop systems and protocols that have allowed for education to continue successfully.

This year as we have been dealing with COVID we have continued to work on our Strategic Plan, making gains in each goal and many specific actions steps. Below are a few examples; a full report can be found on the District website:

Goal 1: The Sunapee School District will provide a rigorous and diverse academic program that promotes high student achievement through an innovative curriculum that is evaluated and adapted to ensure optimum student growth.

1.3 Assess, and strengthen STEAM programs and increase integration into classes: Both schools are running very successful STEAM programs. This year both schools applied for and received robotic grants from the State. Each school is looking to develop a robotic program as an extracurricular activity and compete in local and state competitions.

Goal 2: The Sunapee School District will sustain and expand a welcoming culture focused on cooperation and collaboration, healthy competition, respect for individuality, open communication and support among the school and community, and a positive and inclusive social learning environment.

2.1 Ongoing Communication: This year the District held 5 community forums to receive feedback and input on the proposed District building project. We had a great community involvement with 100-200 community members attending each session. The new District web site has been up and running for a year, and we are able to keep information updated on the site. This past year we rolled out the District application that allowed the community to download and receive information as well as look up information much more efficiently from their phones or personal devices.

2.2 Expand and develop models that recognize student successes: We continue to be a part of the NH Scholars Program. The graduating class of 2020, similar to previous graduating classes, had a large percentage of students qualify for the recognition. This year sponsorship of the Student of the Month was discontinued; however, we are now able to award all Student of the Month recipients with Morgan Hill Bookstore gift certificates. The guidance department also continues to provide a range of honor roll trips for students.



2.3a Promote and support collaboration amongst staff to address the identification and utilization of resources and supports - paraeducators, AT, interventions, community initiatives, accommodations and modifications: The Assistive Technology Team continues to meet weekly to consider technology-related issues that have arisen. The team responds to individual requests, reviews resources, creates support videos and documents, and keeps administration and the Technology Director abreast of things that have come up.

2.4 Parent Education Forums: The District held several parent and community events this year. We also worked in collaboration with the Sunapee Police Department and Abbott Library. We had a forum set up to review the 2019 Youth Risk Behavior Survey before we had to release due to the current pandemic; we hope to reschedule this for early next year.

Goal 4: The Sunapee School District will provide academic and co-curricular schedules that balance the needs of students, teachers, and families.

4.3a Summer Programs: For the second year a summer class was offered that allowed students to gain ½ social studies credit by focusing and writing on specific world history topics such as the non-violent successes of Gandhi, the one child policy of China, and the break-up of the Soviet Union. We continue to offer a high school two-week physical education course each summer, and we intend to offer 2-3 small elective courses this summer as well as a book club which focuses on a summer reading assignment.

Goal 5: The Sunapee School District, in order to foster a culture of growth and to ensure best instructional practices for all students, will promote high quality, continuity, and effectiveness of faculty and staff through comprehensive recruitment, responsive staff development, and authentic evaluation.

5.2 Mentoring: While Sunapee Middle High School has typically had a very low staff turnover rate, we had two new teachers in the 2019/2020 school year, and we will have three new teachers in the 2020/2021 school year. This past year, in addition to an orientation day prior to the staff professional development days, we had formal weekly meetings with our two new faculty members.

5.4a Staff Evaluations: This past year we implemented the new evaluation process for paraeducators. The new process included walkthrough observations and feedback twice per year. Input is gathered from a variety of sources including teachers, special education staff, and administrators. End of year summaries are delivered at the end of May to each paraeducator.

We have offered a multitude of trainings to paraeducators and teachers this year such as CPI training which is required of all special education staff, and Inclusive Schools. For the coming summer we have offered disability related trainings as well as Trauma Informed practices.



Sunapee School District Facility Commitment:

- Maintenance and enhancement of School Facilities to support and enrich the School Programs for 21st century learning.
- Development of the Capital Improvement planning document that will guide the School Board on the issues needed to maintain and enhance the school building and grounds.
- Providing students, parents and teachers with facilities that are up to state and federal codes in safety, environmental issues, and ADA compliance.

Last year the warrant article for a new preK-12 facility did not achieve a 60% majority vote, so over the last year the Sunapee School CIP Committee has continued to research and look for ways to address the issues in our schools, especially the Sunapee Central Elementary School. In late August the CIP Committee engaged in conversation with Energy Efficiency Investments (EEI) from Merrimack, NH. EEI has done a full review of all the information collected for the engineers and architects over the past several years and has developed a comprehensive plan to address all the needs of the elementary school. The proposed comprehensive project is \$10.6 million and will give this community a 50-year solution to a discussion that has been taking place for 24 years.

This school year has certainly brought many challenges to our District. It has only been through our ability to work collaboratively with the teachers' union, support staff, administration, School Board, students, parents and community that we have been able to achieve academic success this year for all our students. This collective effort demonstrates that this community continues to recognize the value in our public school system and trusts the direction of the District. Thank you all for your continued support.





SUNAPEE CENTRAL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S ANNUAL REPORT

So much has happened since the last Principal's Annual Report for Sunapee Central Elementary School. Shortly after last year's annual district meeting, the Governor declared a state-wide quarantine due to the global pandemic caused by COVID-19. This meant that overnight schools across the state, including Sunapee Central, closed their physical buildings and began teaching their students remotely via the Internet. The teachers of Sunapee Central, for the next three months, rose to the challenge and quickly learned new skills in order to design instruction for their students even though they were not physically in our beloved brick and mortar building.

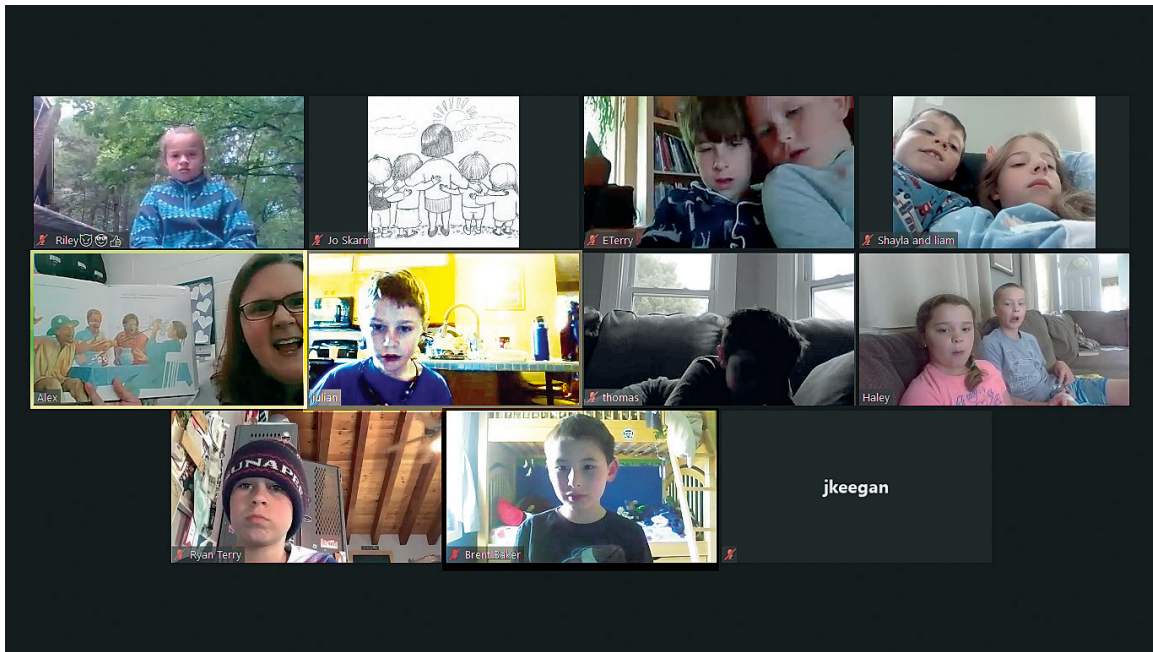
In the midst of all this, Mrs. Jodi Bergen, the principal of Sunapee Central Elementary for the last eight years, retired. I began my tenure as the new principal on July 1st and immediately began working with the District's leadership team as well as the school's leadership team on creating a plan, filled with new protocols and practices, in order for everyone to return to school safely in September in the midst of the pandemic. We also started focusing on preparing our students and families for the possibility of returning to remote if the metrics of the pandemic were to change making it too much of a challenge to remain in the building.

However, preparing and keeping everyone safe during a global pandemic was only a part of our work as a school this year. We needed to put our attention also on the academic needs of our students who had an extended break in their learning due to the quarantine held last spring. Continuing to use the structures put in place by Mrs. Bergen, we continued to assess our students and then used that data to help develop interventions for each student in order to help close the gap caused by last spring's quarantine.

Providing our students opportunities to care for others and to take part in the world around them is another important part of our life here at SCES, and living through a pandemic did not stop that from happening. The students created cards for those isolated from COVID restrictions as well as participated in food drives at Halloween and Thanksgiving by donating close to 200 boxes of cereal and more than enough food for over 10 families. The fifth grade students participated in the NH Kid Governor Program and although she did not win, Shayla Walsh was nominated to run and was elected to the Kid Governor's Executive Council.



An elementary school is a place where not only learning takes place but also where childhood memories are built through its many traditions, and Sunapee Central Elementary School is no exception. However, due to Covid-19, we had to reshape those traditions and create new memories for our students. This year's Holiday Program was reimaged and instead of being presented to an audience of 200+ in the Sherburne Gym, our music teacher, Nikki Bailey, created a winter video using the school building and grounds as well as the town of Sunapee as the backdrops.



As we head into the 2021-2022 school year with COVID-19 behind us, we will start looking ahead to where we want SCES to go and to be remembered as in the years to come. This spring, the staff will be asking themselves that question and, with feedback from the community, will start to prepare a plan for the future. This year has been difficult but it has given us the opportunity to stop and reflect on what is important about teaching, learning, and the place where all that takes place.

On a personal note, I want to thank the community of Sunapee for all your support so far this year, not only to me, but to the entire staff at SCES. We would not be able to do our job if it were not for that support. It truly makes Sunapee a special place to be and work.

SUNAPEE MIDDLE/ HIGH SCHOOL

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Introduction

Although the 2019/2020 school year presented a number of challenges as school was forced to transition to remote learning from March through June due to the COVID-19 restrictions set forth by the state, the dedication and perseverance of the students, teachers, staff members, parents, and the community-at-large ensured that the 2019/2020 school year was valuable, rewarding, and successful for the students at Sunapee Middle/High School.

The students of Sunapee Middle/High School and the school programs that they access continue to thrive. Our student population during the 2019/2020 school year was 246 students on October 1st and 257 students at the close of the school year. These student population numbers include all students in grades 6-12. Sunapee Middle/High School was again recognized by U.S. News and World Report for excellence as SMHS was the **second ranked high school in the state of New Hampshire**.

Sunapee Middle/High School continues to provide the community with a very dedicated faculty and staff, and the school district has continued to implement the strategic plan initiatives this past year.

Instructional Programming

Sunapee Middle /High School continues to provide students with a wide range of college preparatory, advanced placement, and STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art, and mathematics) classes, and students at SMHS must earn a minimum of twenty-two credits to graduate.

Current requirements include four credits in English, four credits in mathematics, two credits in science, three credits in social studies, one credit in both physical education and computers, and one-half credit each in fine arts, and health.

In addition to the heterogeneously grouped college preparatory offerings, Sunapee High School offers:

- Advanced Placement United States History
- Advanced Placement Calculus
- An Honors English Program (Grades 10-12)
- Advanced Placement Physics
- Advanced Placement English Literature and Composition
- Advanced Placement English Language and Composition



- Access to Project Lead the Way Engineering Courses
- Running Start courses which award college credit in Statistics and Citizenship and Law, and English composition
- Access to Dartmouth College courses for qualified junior and senior students
- Access to the Career and Technical Education opportunities at Sugar River Valley Regional Technical Centers in Newport and Claremont

Though we were not able to take any field trips during the spring of 2020 or likely during the 2020/2021 school year, we will continue to expose the students of SMHS to a large number of learning opportunities outside of our community. As safety protocols allow, we intend to continue learning opportunities that include: 6th grade students taking part in Nature's Classroom in Rhode Island each fall, high school students participating in the Close-Up program in Washington D.C., eighth grade class visits to the Gettysburg National Battlefield, and foreign language excursions to foreign countries.

This past year junior SAT was postponed to the fall of 2020. During the fall exam, the average SAT score for the now senior class was 1080 with a reading/writing average mean score of 545 and a math average mean score of 535. These overall average scores were higher than the state average of 1040. Additionally, Sunapee students exceeded national averages on all Advanced Placement exams.

As Sunapee Middle/High School transitioned to remote learning in the spring, our students and staff remained engaged in their education for the entirety of the school year. All students had access to a personal device, the food service team prepared meals for students, Google virtual meets replaced in-class instruction, and students engaged with academic support personnel on-line. Together, we were able to adapt to the challenges, but we were quite pleased when it was announced that learning would be held in-person for the 2020/2021 school year.

In addition to our academic successes, the students at Sunapee Middle High School have contributed to the local community in a variety of ways. This past year, the Sunapee Service Club organized an American Red Cross Blood Drive, donated food baskets to local families, hosted an Empty Bowl dinner, and they provided volunteers to numerous community events.

Conclusion

The students at Sunapee Middle/High School continue to do well academically, and participation in co-curricular activities remains very high as over eighty percent of our students continued to participate in at least one co-curricular activity during the 2019/2020 school year. Students also have the opportunity to participate in academic co-curricular activities including Harvard Model Congress, Mock Trial, and Destination Imagination. Our Thespians were not able to perform their spring play, and the spring sports season was cancelled for the entire state. Despite these setbacks, the athletic teams added another girls' soccer championship in the fall of 2019 as well as a boys' soccer runner-up award, and two individual ski champions.



Co-curricular activities continue to be designed to meet the needs of students. These activities include a biking club, a bee-keeping club, a book club, a robotics team, a chess club, and a pottery club. The parents and community continue to be supportive and involved in these school activities, and the Sunapee Booster Club has continued their strong school involvement in our co-curricular programs.

Perhaps the highlight of the spring was the graduation ceremony for the class of 2020. Unable to hold the graduation ceremony in its traditional format, Mount Sunapee graciously allowed us the use of their parking lots where the ceremony was held as spectators viewed the senior procession from their assigned parking spots. Graduates were able to walk to the stage to receive their diplomas, teachers and staff held signs at the traffic circle, and community members showed their support as Sunapee police and fire led the graduated seniors and their families on a parade through the town.

As in previous years, I would like to thank all of the community members, parents, students, and teachers who support our efforts at Sunapee Middle/High School and who make it such a wonderful place. On behalf of the staff, I assure you that we do not take this support for granted, and we will continue to work diligently to meet the needs of all students and the community of Sunapee.

Student Services Annual Report

It is our mission to educate each child in an environment where the student feels safe, supported and welcomed. The Student Services Department provides a broad spectrum of specialized services to meet the varied needs of students across the district. We provide services to approximately 90 students through Special Education, English Language Learners, 504 Plans, and the Student Support Team.

The Student Services Department is a dedicated group of professionals trained to meet the diverse academic, developmental and functional needs of our community's children. Our staff is comprised of in-district Special Education Teachers / Case Managers, Paraeducators, Registered Behavior Technicians, Principals/LEAs, Licensed Speech/Language Pathologists, Licensed & Certified School Psychologist, and Licensed Occupational Therapists. Additionally, we contract with service providers such as a Board Certified Behavior Analyst, Mental Health Clinician, Teacher of the Visually Impaired, and Teacher of the Deaf. This staff works tirelessly to deliver high quality services throughout the school year.

2020 has been a transformative year in education. We have learned to adapt to a fully remote platform for teaching and learning, to conduct meetings remotely, to evaluate students remotely or through alternative means, and to maintain accurate and legally sufficient documents almost completely digitally. While this was a difficult process which took countless hours, it has allowed us to grow in ways that were unexpected. We will have more tools in our teaching tool boxes, we have new and updated information about what students are or are not capable of, and we have more digital supports for clerical tasks that have taken away from instruction in the past.

Compensatory Education

Despite our best intentions, efforts, and creative solutions, there were some students for whom remote instruction was extremely challenging. On May 26, 2020, Governor Sununu issued Emergency Order #48 requiring that all New Hampshire school districts determine the impact of remote learning on those students with IEPs. Students who were unable to receive special education services, suffered education regression, or who failed to make expected progress on their IEP goals were entitled to receive compensatory educational services. The emergency order required that we convene a meeting for every identified student to determine compensatory services resulting from the transition to remote learning during the 2019-2020 school year. During our compensatory education meetings, we looked at what we learned in the spring about the needs of each student as a remote learner and incorporated those pieces of information into the plans that were attached to the IEP in order to support the greatest success possible moving forward. We found that most of our students were able to access their programming with the supports of their general education teachers and special education staff.

The success of our students could not have been possible without the support of Sunapee's parents and community members. We are so fortunate to be part of such an inspiring and committed team.

To the inhabitants of the School District of the Town of Sunapee qualified to vote upon District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the **Sunapee Middle High School Gymnasium** located on 10 North Road in said Sunapee, New Hampshire on Monday, February 3, 2020 at 7PM for the first session of the Annual School District Meeting to deliberate upon the articles, and to meet again at the David W. Sherburne Gymnasium located on Route 11 in said Sunapee, New Hampshire on Tuesday, March 10, 2020 between the hours of 8AM and 7PM for the second session of the Annual School District Meeting to vote by ballot upon the following articles:

Moderator Aaron Simpson called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM and requested Jesse Tyler, School Board Chair to lead us in The Pledge of Allegiance.

Present at the head table were: Superintendent Russ Holden; Kelly Wessells, Business Administrator, Kathleen Carroll, School Clerk; School Board Members Jesse Tyler, Chair; Scott Ritzmann, Vice Chair; Edward Andersen, Kerri McCaul Claus and Andrew Nichols, Members.

Moderator Simpson then spoke of the Rules for the meeting.

1. To choose a moderator, clerk and a treasurer for one year terms, and two members of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

The polls were open on March 10th, 2020 from 8:00 AM – 7:00 PM. The following votes were cast:

2. To hear reports of agents, auditors and committees or officers heretofore chosen.

Articles 1 and 2 are moved to the March 10th ballot.

Moderator Simpson read article 3.

3. Shall the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,600,000 (gross budget) for the Sunapee Consolidation School Project, which includes constructing and equipping a new elementary school connected to the Middle High School, constructing and equipping renovations to the Middle High School, renovating existing athletic fields, construction of a new soccer field and a cinder track, and acquiring approximately 6.5 acres of land (part of Tax Map 123, Lot 4) for the field and track (the "Project"); and authorize the issuance of \$25,600,000 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33); and authorize the School Board to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and determine the date, maturities, interest rate, and other details of such bonds or notes; and raise and appropriate an additional sum of \$450,489 from taxation for debt service payments due on such bonds or notes during the 2020-2021 fiscal year; and authorize the School Board to accept on behalf of the District any federal, state, or private funds that may become available with respect to the Project?
(The Sunapee School Board recommends approval) (3/5 ballot vote required)
(Est. Tax Impact: \$.36/ \$1,000)

An amendment to Article 3 was presented by Andrew Nichols and Seconded by Jesse Tyler. (attached) The amendment is as follows:

Shall the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,600,000 (gross budget) for the Sunapee Consolidation School Project, which includes constructing and equipping a new elementary school connected to the Middle High School, constructing and equipping renovations to the Middle High School, renovating existing athletic fields, construction of a- new ~~soocer~~ athletic fields and a cinder track, and acquiring approximately 6.5 acres of land (part of Tax Map 123, Lot 4) ~~for the field and track~~ (the "Project"); and authorize the issuance of \$25,600,000 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33); and authorize the School Board to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and determine the date, maturities, interest rate, and other details of such bonds or notes; and raise and appropriate an additional sum of \$450,489 from taxation for debt service payments due on such bonds or notes during the 2020-2021 fiscal year; and authorize the School Board to accept on behalf of the District any federal, state, or private funds that may become available with respect to the Project?
(The Sunapee School Board recommends approval) (3/5 ballot vote required)
(Est. Tax Impact: \$.36/ \$1,000)

Moderator Simpson asked for discussion.

Jesse Tyler stated that the driver for the amendment is the athletic fields: soccer, track, softball, and fixing existing fields. Just changing the wording of it to make it clear to cover all the fields.

Moderator Simpson asked if all in favor for the motion to amend say Aye; oppose say No.

The Aye's have it, the amended article was moved to the ballot.

The Moderator asked if anyone wanted to address the amended warrant article.

John Berger spoke to the tax impact that is estimated in the pamphlet of \$.36/\$1,000 does not include any interest payment in the following years or principal amortization. Is there a reason why those are not included?

Russ Holden stated that our attorney prepares these warrant articles and they are checked with the RA at the State of NH. This is how we were asked to form these articles. The pamphlet at the back table shows an amortization schedule and indicates the impact of the budget for the first year and second year.

John Berger asked if there is a regulatory reason why that is not included as part of the warrant article. Did council say you could not do that?

Russ Holden stated that we are raising and appropriating for the 2020-2021 budget and not the 2021-2022 budget.

John Berger asked if state regulations do not allow you to do that?

Russ Holden stated that that is how they are told to do that.

The Moderator asked if anyone else wanted to speak to the amended article.

Arlene Adams spoke about the interest rate on the amortization schedule is 5%.

Russ Holden stated the interest rate is 3.5%.

Arlene Adams also spoke about the tax impact of \$.36/\$1000 for the first year is for interest only and the impact in the second year at \$.207/\$1000. She feels it is a little deceiving when reading the warrant article.

Russ Holden indicated that there are a lot of variables that could cause the rate to go up or down.

Arlene Adams mentions that the flyers that went out would have been more appropriate to show people what the true amount would be per thousand in subsequent years?

Russ Holden stated that the information has been on the website and another flyer is coming out that will have the tax impact on it as well from 2020-2021 and 2021-2022.

Jesse Tyler spoke more about the interest rate reporting and on the Arlene Adams' comments about the towns people probably don't understand that the tax impact will be more than \$.36/\$1000 in subsequent years. The board has been as transparent as possible in reporting the tax impacts.

Moderator Simpson asked if anyone else wanted to speak on this.

Rob Simpson spoke to the tax impact in the flyer stating \$.36/\$1000 and that people not here tonight or without internet access would not know about the second-year impact being \$.2.07/\$1000 and will be voting on a commitment where they think it is \$.36/\$1000. When we vote on March 10th to raise the sum of \$450,489 are we then locked in to this \$25,600,000 plan? If that is the case, then we need to amend this to have a second year impact and beyond of \$.2.07/\$1000 on the document while people are voting.

Moderator Simpson stated that all amendments must be in writing.

Rob Simpson would like to add a line below the \$.36/\$1000 regarding the tax impact.

Moderator Simpson stated that the portion of the warrant article Rob Simpson would like to amend is not part of the warrant. These provisions have to be adopted by the School Board.

Jesse Tyler stated that the School Board will discuss adding the \$.2.07/\$1000 into the language of the warrant.

Moderator Simpson asked if anyone opposed listening to the School Board to discuss this.

No one opposed.

Jesse Tyler made a motion to the board to include \$.2.07/\$1000 into the language at the end of the warrant.

Ed Andersen seconded.

School Board Discussing.

Kerry McCaul Claus stated that if they are going to add that, that it needs to be clear that the \$.2.07 is not going to be for the life of the loan.

School Board Discussing...

Jesse Tyler read his amendment – to include estimated tax impact year two only \$.2.07/\$1000.

Moderator Simpson is taking back the meeting.

Amendment not made.

Ted Gallup stated the \$.36/\$1000 will not be on the ballot. The state doesn't allow it.

Jesse Tyler – A new flyer will have new information.

John Augustine stated that last year the request was for \$26 million and 60% of the voters said no. This year the request is for \$25.6 million. It seems like no lessons have been learned by the overwhelming vote from last year.

Kevin Cooney spoke in support of Article 3 and stated that Sunapee has the tenth lowest tax rate in New Hampshire. He stated that 33 years have passed since we have voted to improve the educational system for our children that go to the elementary school.

Shaun Carroll spoke in support of Article. If this article doesn't go through and the school board doesn't bring anything else forward, where are the kids going to go? It's a big choice if we want to let this go because there is no turning back.

Harry Tether commended the CIP for their transparent process. He stated there are add-ons in the article that go beyond the crucial needs of the elementary school. Additional important questions are being unanswered. What are the prospective operating savings; what to do with the old elementary school? Should the vote for the proposed article fall short in March, let's resolve the other outstanding issues and focus efforts on the critical elementary school needs.

Kaitlin Clapp, member of the SPTA, stated that the SPTA has existing funds in their budget that they would allot to this project should this vote pass.

Arlene Adams stated she supports Sunapee schools. We do need to do something – why don't we do this in stages? Address some of the major issues first and do it in increments. Has the School Board approached any local banks? She also spoke of interest rates and asked if there are issues that make the costs go higher.

Russ Holden stated they have approached local banks. Tuition brings revenue – helps offset next year's tax rate. He continued responding about the bond bank.

Jesse Tyler spoke about the elementary school and what to do with it. It needs to be discussed with the public if the article is passed. Also spoke about the tuition rate for students from other towns. It is not \$33,000 per student. They accept them at the tuition rates that is at the level of the "sending" towns allot for those families.

Arlene Adams is questioning the \$33,000 cost per student.

Russ Holden stated that the tuition rate is not \$33,000 per student and explained the cost per pupil.

Andy Nichols spoke to Arlene Adam's question about if they run into problems building the new school and stated they can't ask for more money if there are contingencies.

Kathryn Hurd stated 10 years ago her family was shopping around for a home in the surrounding areas and found the taxes in the Kearsarge district are double what they pay here in Sunapee. A new school is overdue.

Mike Durfor asked if the new school will be lead certified and if not, will it at least pass indoor air quality standards.

Ingrid Nichols, Architect for the new school stated it will not be lead certified but they will be going through the chips checklist.

Joe Briggs stated the most important thing we can do for our children is invest in this community. Sunapee is ranked 3rd in the state.

Ed Preston asked if there had been any input from security experts.

Jesse Tyler spoke regarding security and working with experts.

Brad Prescott, project manager, spoke of security and safety with this project.

Ed Preston asked if there has been a traffic study done for the area of Seven Hearths.

Andy Nichols stated they are aware of potential hazard and will need a traffic study done if this passes.

Russ Holden stated there was a preliminary traffic study done by town and is still being completed.

Laura Herd had a safety question regarding one campus and how you got to the decision of doing one campus and how are you going to integrate the young children with older children and concerns about busses.

Andy Nichols stated busses are shared by children of all ages.

Laura Herd asked what was the decision making of combining the schools.

Jesse Tyler stated they looked at a lot of previous plans. He explained that the costs were higher to have separate schools and also explained the decision into making it one campus.

Darryl Sencabaugh, school bus driver, stated the children are segregated on the bus – the youngest in front and older students in the back and there have been no issues.

Moderator Simpson asked if there were any more questions. Hearing none he asked for a motion to move the amended warrant article to the town warrant.

Daryl Sencabaugh made a motion to move the article.

Katie Flint seconded.

Moderator Simpson asked all in favor to say Aye and opposed say No.

The Aye's have it and the article is moved.

Jesse Tyler made a motion to restrict reconsideration of article 3.

Ed Andersen seconded.

Moderator stated if this motion passes means we will not revisit Article 3 tonight.

Moderator asked if there were any questions about the motion. There were none.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

To the Members of the School Board and Management
Sunapee School District

Report on the Financial Statements. We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Sunapee School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2020, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the School District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements. Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the basic financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of risks of material misstatement of the financial statement, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the School District's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the School District's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion.

An audit also includes evaluation of the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluation of the overall presentation of the financial statements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions. In our opinion, the basic financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Sunapee School District, as of June 30, 2020, and the respective changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters.

Required Supplementary Information. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the *Management Discussion and Analysis* beginning on page iii and the budgetary and pension information presented in the section marked *Required Supplementary Information* be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the

basic financial statements, is required by Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and therefore express no opinion on it.

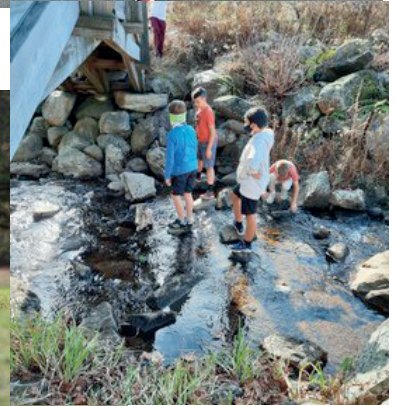
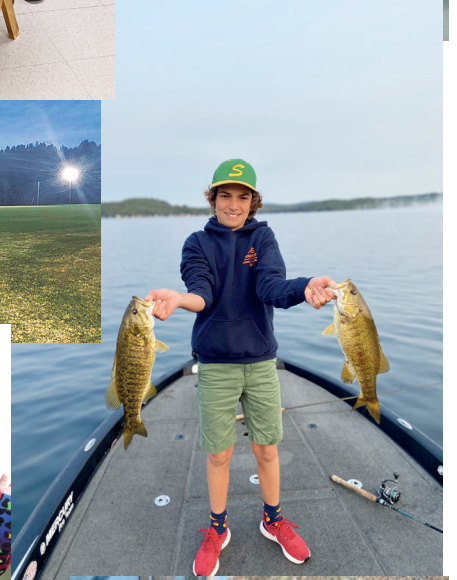
